he winter months are typically our time to catch up on projects and set the agenda for the year ahead. This year is no different and all of us at the Pabst Mansion have been busy on a multitude of fronts, setting our goals and beginning our planned improvements for the year.

You will notice several restoration projects are making progress, both on the interior and exterior of the Mansion. Historic tile restoration has just been completed in both the Regency Room Bathroom and Elsbeth's Bathroom. This is enabling us to move forward with the decorative painting of the walls in Elsbeth's Bathroom later this year.

We have just placed the order for new custombuilt oak-framed windows for the Pavilion hallway. This will be a tremendous improvement for our Pavilion gift shop and will mark the beginning of the restoration work on the Pavilion itself.

Thanks to a leaking pipe on the second floor, which thankfully caused minimal damage to the old area of the servant's quarters known as the Maid's Pantry, repairs will have to be made to

the plaster ceiling in this space adjacent to the Servants' Dining Room. Because of this, we are exploring the reintroduction of original cabinetry that once housed the Mansion's dry goods in an effort to further interpret the servant's areas of the Mansion. Thanks in part to television programs such as *Downton Abbey*, our visitors are more curious than ever regarding our servant's quarters and we are looking for ways to further develop these spaces throughout the Mansion.



In Memoriam

The Pabst Mansion is sad to announce the loss of Donalda Hammersmith and Kav Repp. Donalda was one of the Mansion's founders and part of the team who saved the house from demolition. She also was the founder of Arnell-Hammersmith Interiors and Donalda's Boutique. For many years her firm ran the Schlitz Circus Parade in Milwaukee.

Kay Repp was a longtime volunteer. Born in 1909, Kay volunteered over 30 years continuing until she was 104 years old. Working every Thursday in the Gift Shop, she accumulated over 20,000 hours of service. Once she retired, she continued to visit every Christmas season with her family. From the Archives

"I Christen Thee, Fred Pabst!"

y 1890, Captain Pabst was riding high and well on his way to becoming Milwaukee's representative citizen during a period known as the "Pabst Decade". The name of the Phillip Best Brewing Company had been changed the year before to the Pabst Brewing Company and the name of Pabst was already wellestablished throughout the city. An honor was extended to Captain Pabst in 1889 when Wolf & Davidson, Milwaukee's leading ship builder, decided to name its new wooden bulk freighter after Pabst. Wolf & Davidson,

founded by William Wolf and Captain Thomas Davidson in 1858, began a program in the mid-1880s to build four large steam vessels for hauling coal. The first, the William H. Wolf was launched in 1887, followed by the Thomas Davidson in 1888. The Fred Pabst was the third ship and at the time, the largest ship to have ever been built on Lake Michigan. She measured 310 feet-the length of an average city block, was built of oak and iron and could carry 3,000 tons of coal, costing \$155,000 to build.

As the ship was named after a former Great Lakes steamship captain, now beer baron, who never lost his love of the lake, Captain Pabst must have been beaming with pride on the day the ship was launched. On April 6, 1890 a crowd of eight to ten thousand gathered at the Wolf & Davidson shipyard, located at the confluence of the Milwaukee and Kinnickinnic Rivers. At 2:32, with all the support blocks holding the hull cleared, the final ropes

were cut and with a quiver, the Fred Pabst began to slide

down the ways and hit the water "with a tremendous

splash sending the spray hundreds of feet in the air".

Following the launch, the vessel continued to be fitted out and was put into service the following month. Sailors in the 19th century were often known for keeping pets aboard ships for amusement. The crew of the Fred Pabst were no different. However, their mascot was more unusual than most—they had a pig! The Fred Pabst's distinction as the largest vessel built on Lake Michigan was short-lived. The fourth and final freighter built by Wolf & Davidson, the Ferdinand Schlesinger, was thirtyeight feet longer than the Fred Pabst, and launched the

> following year. In an interesting note, Captain Pabst and a group of his friends sailed aboard the Fred Pabst on a "pleasure cruise" through the chain of Great Lakes before docking in Buffalo, New York in August of 1892. One can imagine him taking the wheel of the ship and recalling his career almost thirty years prior on the waves of Lake Michigan.

> The Fred Pabst served its owner well, transporting coal for the Northwestern Fuel Company

for years. Finally, on October 11, 1907, the Fred Pabst collided with the steamer Lake Shore in the St. Clair River, near Point Edward, Ontario, Canada and the Fred Pabst sank close to shore. As she was not in deep water, the crew retreated to the pilot house where they were later rescued. The ship's passing came at a time when the wooden hulled vessels of the 19th century were being replaced by the newer steel hulls of the 20th century. While the coal trade on Lake Michigan was greatly reduced in the advancing decades of the century, the Port of Milwaukee still takes delivery of coal and the memory of the Fred Pabst is a reminder of that long legacy.

A Perfect Fit

aptain and Mrs. Pabst purchased *Still Life of Flowers and Strawberries* by Jean Baptiste Robie while traveling in Europe in 1894-95 and gave it pride of place in the Pabst



Mansion's Dining Room upon their return. The family enjoyed the painting for generations, but in the early 20th Century the original Victorian gilded frame was considered passé and was replaced with a dark Dutch frame to harmonize with the Jacobean interior of the Fred Pabst, Jr. residence where it hung for over fifty years. Thanks to the generosity of the Pabst family, the painting returned to its original place in the Mansion's dining room.



Historic frames are now appreciated for how they enhanced works of art, as many artists themselves chose the frames their paintings were to be placed in. A historic site, like the Pabst Mansion, is further enhanced when its paintings are framed in their period appropriate manner.

Working with Lowy Frames and Restoration in New York City, an almost identical 1890s frame was found. In January 2016, the painting was properly placed in the frame and returned to its rightful place in the Dining Room.

Collections Object Update

In 2013 Joseph R. Pabst donated a piece of artwork original to the 3rd Ifloor Library back to the Pabst Mansion entitled Champion Trinkets Chief painted by John Martin Tracy. The oil on canvas painting, featuring the favorite pointer of Gustave Pabst, hung in this location during Gustave's residency, but eventually left to adorn the walls of his Highland Boulevard mansion in the late 1890s. As decades passed by, the painting, which remained a favorite among Gustave's descendants, was reframed to change with styles, but in 2015 it was brought full circle when an 1890s gilded frame was secured and the canvas placed within giving it the look and feel Gustave Pabst opted for so long ago.

Thanks to the generosity of our Volunteer Council, the roundel windows in the Captain's Study are undergoing restoration. One window was completed in Fall and the second will be restored in Spring.



A mirror above the mantle in the third floor Primary Guest Suite was removed to uncover the original wallpaper. Featuring wreaths, birds, and swaas this sample can be recreated to restore the bedroom.



Elsbeth's Bathroom received a new marble basin and the tile work from the first floor guest bathroom was removed to restore the floor where a modern bathtub was installed durina the Archbishop's residency.

New Arrivals


7ith the one year anniversary of the opening of the 3rd floor on April 1, many new objects are being brought into the collection to fill the mantles, walls, and floors of five additional rooms. Below are a few of the items to look for next time you visit.

On August 27, 1892, a writer for the Milwaukee Journal produced an article covering the annual Milwaukee Exhibition and stated "...this picture of two finely drawn horses drinking from a trough. This is his latest work and is deserving of the highest admiration." It was referencing the painting Hard Toilers by Richard Lorenz which was purchased for and displayed in one of the prominent mansions of Grand Avenue. Over 120 years later it is on display again in a "Grand Avenue" mansion thanks to the generosity of the Van Antwerpen family.





The Newspaper Boy was painted in 1899 by Karl Witkowski, and was donated to the Pabst Mansion by Nancy Riesen Laitinen, a relation of Milwaukee's Usinger family. Prior to its arrival, both the canvas and original frame underwent extensive restoration bringing the piece to the stunning appearance you see today!







Donated by Carl Wallenmeyer in 2015, this porcelain and brass lamp was converted from kerosene to electric, but still retains its original duplex burner. It is marked P+A for Plume and Atwood Manufacturing Co. The business was incorporated in January 1880, and produced a full line of lamps and lamp trimmings at its factory in Waterbury, Connecticut, with warehouses in New York, Chicago, and Boston in the 19th century.
