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Layers of a Portrait: Archival Finds and Newfound Perspectives

year ago, in early October 2018, we received an e-mail from Dr. Frederick Pabst Wurlitzer asking if we would be interested in a series of scrapbooks that had been organized by his mother, Pauline Pabst Wurlitzer. Pauline was the only daughter of Ida and Frederick Pabst, Jr.'s seven children and one of the eldest grandchildren of Captain and Mrs. Pabst. We had no idea the treasure trove that was about to be shared with us, as held within these eleven scrapbooks were hundreds of photographs, including some of the oldest known images of the Pabst and Uihlein families as well as other historic materials and documents.

Over three decades earlier, Dr. Wurlitzer had bestowed on the Pabst Mansion a set of the original 1897 photographs taken of the Mansion's interior. Those photographs have proven to be invaluable, allowing us to complete so much restoration, as well as enabling us to identify hundreds of furnishings, objects and paintings that were part of the Mansion's original interior. These scrapbooks are just as important

for the history of the Pabst family, as they span over one hundred years and five generations. Late this summer, we took possession of the scrapbooks and are now just beginning the insightful process of making connections, utilizing the scrapbooks to better inform us about other objects and histories.

Case in point, since the *Pauline Pabst Wurlitzer Scrapbook Collection* has come into the Archive, we have found ourselves again and again doing a little jump of excitement when we come across images that shine new light on objects long-known at the Mansion. One such example is a photo of Harald Pabst taken in 1924 by prominent San Francisco-based photographer Arnold Genthe (1869-1942), which shows a photographic counterpart to the portrait painting of him by the renowned artist Jean McLane (1878-1964) completed in the same year. To see the child in the same setting from the perspectives of two artists, one working behind a camera lens and the other through a painterly eye, brings a greater appreciation of both and makes one wonder more deeply what exactly each drew from the young subject.



Sails on Skates: An Iceboat for Frederick Pabst, Jr.

rederick Pabst, Jr. clearly shared his father's love of the water, no matter the state or season. At the turn of the 20th century, Fred ventured to see how his summer sailing skills fared in the Wisconsin winter. The Pabst Mansion Archive's Frederick Pabst, Jr. Letterboxes Collection contains materials pertaining to the iceboat 'Comet' (recalling the name of his father's steamship), an ice yacht crafted by the company Jones & LaBorde of Oshkosh, WI in 1901. In correspondence dated November 18, 1901, which accompanied a blueprint of the vessel, J.H. Jones penned: 'We have taken great care in constructing "Comet," and feel satisfied that we have turned out a Boat, both for speed and appearance, which cannot be exceeded'. While the blueprint and correspondence were themselves intriguing, a photograph was not present in the



collection to showcase the finished product. Therefore, it was with great enthusiasm that images of the craft from 1909 were discovered in the recent acquisition of the *Pauline Pabst Wurlitzer Scrapbook Collection*.

Photographs and written descriptions of the 'Comet' show it to be a sleek, handsome boat comprised of silk sails, oak beams and sharp skates. Sailing on ice is similar to sailing on water in the sense that the boat is sailed close-hauled and on the wind; however, the physics behind ice sailing allow the craft to travel up to five times faster than wind velocity, meaning speeds

greater than 70 miles per hour can be reached. Thus, the sport may only be palatable for those who seek a frigid thrill.

The exact origins of 'ice yachting' remain rather nebulous. Engravings reveal ice sailing was prevalent in the Netherlands during the 17th century, and records indicate that near the end of the 18th century the Dutch brought their iceboat technology to the Hudson River Valley, where the sport of ice sailing developed in the United States. Oliver Booth began building iceboats at Poughkeepsie as early as 1790, and the vessel and sport continued to grow in popularity and refinement throughout the 19th and 20th centuries. While races on the Hudson in the East received the most press in the sport's formative years, Wisconsin too developed ice yachting enthusiasts. An article in the Oshkosh Northwestern from January of 1902 remarks, 'It is estimated that all the way from 160 to 200 boats of all classes are owned and sailed by the several clubs of the state'. Since this time the sport has only grown, and iceboating remains a uniquely northern sport with Wisconsin serving as an iceboater paradise.

Picture Perfect: Simon L. Stein and the Pabst Family

ne of the favorite holiday gift-giving traditions of the late 19th century was the exchanging of photographs. A still relatively new technology, photographs were viewed as a sentimental gift that could be framed or placed into an album of other cherished photos. The Pabst family had an early interest in photography and the Pabst Mansion is indeed fortunate to house hundreds of photographs that capture the family during the 19th century. The family's

penchant for having their likeness captured on a regular basis was fostered by their long association with Simon L. Stein, Milwaukee's leading society photographer.

Stein was born in Marienbad, Germany in 1854 and emigrated to America in 1866, settling in Chicago. It was in

the Windy City that he was introduced to the profession of photography as a young boy and worked under early Chicago photographer A. J. Larson. The following decade, Stein moved to Milwaukee and found employment with Hugo Broich, who had a studio at Third Street and State. Several of the earliest photographs in our collection come from the Broich Studio where the Pabst family first made

the acquaintance of Mr. Stein. By 1879, Stein had assumed the studio of his employer and officially opened the business under his name. For the next four decades, the photographs produced from the studio of S. L. Stein were considered among the finest in the city. Without exaggeration, he was widely known across the county and internationally, winning awards for his work in addition to serving as the president of the Photographers' Association of America at the turn of the 20th century.

Among Stein's many skills were his ability to create special effects by altering the glass plate negative on which the image was captured. For the holidays, Stein used a technique of placing small specs of retouching paint on the glass negative and when it was finally printed, it gave the charming effect of the subject of the photo being outside in the snow. We have two of these photos in our collection, one of Captain and Mrs. Pabst's daughter-in-law, Ida Uihlein Pabst and the other of Mrs. Pabst's sister's grandson, Reinhard Heyl. Through other techniques of lighting, Stein could convey a frosty atmosphere, as seen with the image of Elsbeth Pabst, bundled up like a Victorian snow baby. These are just a few of the amazing photos that we have in our collection, highlighting the skill and creativity of one of America's great photographers and his relationship with a family that enthusiastically patronized him for two generations.



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



